RESOLUTION - APPRECIATION TO SOUTH CAROLINA



RESOLUTION - INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATIONS ON ACID PRECIPITATION

WHEREAS, acid precipitation is a transboundary problem having an adverse and worsening effect on the fisheries and other aquatic resources of Canada and the United States; and

WHEREAS, the bilateral negotiations between the United States and Canada, intended to mitigate and eventually solve this pervasive problem, have stalled:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the American Fisheries Society, assembled at its 112th Annual Meeting, September 23, 1982, in Hilton Head, South Carolina, strongly urge that the governments of the United States and Canada reactivate negotiations immediately to develop a transboundary air pollution treaty, a necessary first step to thwart the growing threat of acid precipitation to fisheries and other aquatic resources of Canada and the United States.
